

COVID-19 Enforcement & Compliance Resources

Violation of the Governor's reopening guidance is a C Misdemeanor. However, the Oregon State Police Department has issued a statement saying, *"The level of this violation is **not** for reporting police, fire or medical emergencies through 911. People may choose to self-educate their fellow Oregonians or if a large gathering is noted, they may call their respective police agency's non-emergency number."*

Contact **Oregon OSHA** if you are an employee, or a concerned customer, in Oregon and want to report hazards at a worksite, or believe you have been discriminated against on the basis of safety and health issues. You can file a complaint by filling out the online complaint form linked below. The form requests "Contact Person" first and last name. If you are uncertain insert of a business name you can try looking the owner's name up online or simply insert the words "First" and "Last".
